
First storm of season leaves its mark

The severe thunderstorm that hit metropolitan Detroit late Monday and early Tuesday, as might be expected, did some damage in

Farmington. But it wasn't insurmountable and no injuries were reported, said Michael Wiggins, deputy director of the Farmington Public Safety

Department.
From 8 a.m. Monday to 8 a.m. Tuesday, 19 of 41 public safety runs were storm-related, Wiggins said.

*Most of those were downed (electrical) wires and downed tree limbs, "Wiggins said.
There was one reported garage fire, which broke out about 7:30


We had to wait for Edison to make the area safe, "Wiggins said. During the interim, firefighters kept people away from the area and aprayed water to keep flames from spreading. Officer John Coyle said other downed electrical wires include on Leelane near Marahehead and on Meadowlark.

Coyle added that the storm felled tree limbs on Lilac, at Grand River, Meadowlark and Meadowlark Court, and near city hall on Liberty Street.

Also, the loss of electrical power forced both Flanders and Lanigan elementary schools to be closed on Tuesday.
