## MISS RANDALL GETS THE PIANO

**BLANCHE ANGLIM DRAWS A \$75 DIAMOND RING**

Farmington Epworth League is Credited with \$200 on a \$400 Grinnell Piano

The subscription contest which has been waged the past eight weeks by the Pontiac Press Gazette came to a close last Saturday night.

In district No. 2, which included Farmington, Miss Lucile Randall of Farmington, who lives on rural route No. 1, secured first prize, a \$400 Grinnell piano; Helen Hammond of Wixom won the second prize, a \$100 diamond ring; Blanche Anglim of Farmington a \$75 diamond ring and Ethel Grant of Commerce a gold watch.

The \$400 Grinnell piano in district No. 3 went to the B. V. P. U. of Birmingham, while the O. E.

S. of Ortonville was awarded a \$250 payment on a \$400 piano and the Epworth League of Farmington a \$200 payment on a piano of the same value, while a payment of \$150 went to the Willing Workers of Orion.

## BROMLEY DISCOURAGED

**Failed to Get Released Under the Poor Debtors Act**

Elmer Bromley, the man who has spent the time since last January in the county jail at Pontiac rather than pay a judgment of \$300 and costs, which Richard Tucker had secured against him for alienation of his wife's affections, was Monday denied release under the poor debtors act, because he had fraudulently disposed of his property to avoid payment of the judgment. Tucker has been paying the board of the prisoner all the time he has been confined and admits that he will keep it up as long as Bromley refuses to pay. The amount of the judgment, interest and board bill now amount to between \$500 and \$600. Monday night Bromley threatened to kill himself if not released and was later found in a spasm, but the officials were undetermined as to whether he had taken poison as he claimed or was only shamming.
