## Mercy golfers No. 1 in Division I



When the 1999 season started, the Mercy High School golf team's goal was to win a state title. The season ended Saturday with the Marlins taking possession of the championship trophy following a convincing win in East Lansing.

With Farmington Hills Mercy hold-ing a substantial lead after the first day of competition in the state tourna-ment, JV girls golf coach Andy Slonina figured it was safe to bet on the Mar-lins.

In anticipation of a Mercy victory Saturday, he had hats that already read Mercy Golf embroidered with the additional words Division I 1999 state

additional words 'Division 1 1999 state champs' Friday night. Slonina's money and effort didn't go to waste, and he was able to present the Mercy players and varsity coaches

with the bats Saturday afternoon.

The Marlins didn't disappoint as they went on to claim their first state title in the 20-year history of their program at the conclusion of the second day.

Mercy's previous best was a pair of third-place finishes. The Marlins are also the first Catholic League team to win a state championship in girls golf.

Shooting 350 on the first fay at Forcest Akers East Golf Course in East Lansing, the Marlins were 14 strokes ahead of Grand Blane and 19 in front of Rochester Adams.

"Actually, I think the girls were a lit-tle disappointed Friday," said Mercy

head coach Vicky Kowalski, who started the program in 1980. "Three-fifty was the highest score we had all year, but the course was playing tough.
"But we looked at what everybody else did and thought 'Well, maybe we didn't do so bad. Saturday people were truly impressed with our score on that course. We came to the forefront, and we came to play Saturday."

The Marlins left no doubt who was going to win and clinched the title by shooting a 328 team score on the West Course, the more difficult of the two.

Mercy finished with a 678 team total and ended up winning by 36 strokes over runner-up Adams and 54 ever Grand Blane, which slipped to third place.


