Michigan Gov. Jim Blanchard appointed Harris, having been recommended by Hand. "I owe my job as judge to Michael Hand."

Farmington City Manager Frank Lauhoff met Judge Hand when he arrived in town in 1974. I remember an extremely brilliant judge. He was

part of the community and cared about the people and law enforcement. You always knew when you walked into court he would do right and be fair."
Lauhoff described Hand as "charismatic and brilliant. You didn't worry going into court when he was the judge."

Hand's print on the Farmington-Parmington Hills area goes back decades, beginning with his move to a Farmington home in 1957.

In 1984, Hand was elected associate municipal judge for the city of Farmington, followed up with election in 1986 to municipal judge. Then, in 1988, he was voted in to lead the new 47th District Court, taking the eath on the first day of 1989. He served there until his retirement in May 1989.

Irish humor

Another element of the Toronto-born Hand's makeup was his penchant for Irish humor - specifically St. Patrick's Day, Campbell said.

"He was one for a quick joke," said Campbell, who was first elected to the council in 1984. "St. Patrick's Day was a big day for him, too.

After coming to the United States in 1924, Hand attended Gesu Parochial School and University of Dotroit High School. While at the U.D, he received every major speaking awar given by that institution.

Time was spent honoring America. Hand entered the Army in July 1941 and achieved that rank of lieutenant colonel with the Army Air Force, which he left in 1946. While in service, he was the adjustant general and inspector general of the 314 Bomb Wing.

Trial lawyer

Upon returning to civilian life, Hand graduated from the U.D Law School and joined the law firm of Monaghan, Hart and Crawmer, From 1850-99, he was senior partner of Hand, Sullivan, Hull and



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
