
#### **Drawer fire**

## Plenty of items up for bids in Hills auction Saturday

From unspoken for bikes to 100-meg computers, the annual city of Farmington Hills auction likely has it on the block.

On Saturday, June 26, people will put on their bidding hats to have a chance to land a number of items. The auction takes place in the police department parking lot on the south side of 11 Mile Rond, west of Orchard Lake.

Items can be viewed starting at 9 a.m. with the auction following at 10 a.m. A professional auctioneer conducts the event.

"We have some really good items this year," said Kelly Monico, Hills city purchaser. "A lot of items are from police drug forfeiture, which is nice because the money we get goes to (anti-drug) education and crimp prevention."

Other auction money raised goes into the general fund, which lightens the taxpayer load somewhat.

While the computers are not considered speed demons by industry standards, "They'll still run the same software." Monico said.

Sometimes the auctioneer will lump itemstogether to make an attractive package. So, someone who offers to buy a set of golf clubs might get a file cabinet thrown in.

New stuff is being added as police property room and city storage areas are emptied, said Monico, who is compiling the list.

One of the more bizarre pieces includes dental equipment, which was likely stolen.

Municipal auctions are popular events. Bespite rain and cold, last year's Hills auction drew 200 people. Police Chaplain Corps will be selling refreshments.

# Hills man served country, community

John J. Murphy could listen to an argument as well as give a compelling

one.

As a baseball umpire,
the longresident handled a fair share of

Murphy is remembered as a caring, passionate man who championed civil rights and equality. He died in a Livonia nursing home June 21. He was

85.
"When he would walk into a room, he'd talk to everybody,"

room, he'd talk to everybody," said son Tom Murphy. He was a gregarious person."

Whether it was baseball, polities or his service as a U.S. Marine during World War II, Murphy had plenty to share.

Murphy and his wife of 61 years, Martha, moved into then Farmington Township after the war in 1945. They remained in the same home on Westhill Street in the Orchard Lake-10 Mile area for 54 years.

He remained active in the Farmington Committee on Aging and in the Farmington Demo-

cratic Club, where he

cratic Club, where he was a precinct delegate.
Mayor Aldo Vagnozzi considered Murphy a political ally.
When Vagnozzi was mayor pro-tem in the early 1990s, his selection to mayor by colleagues looked precarious. Murphy came out to a Hills city council meeting in support of him.
"I went into the meeting with a 2-5 vote and came out with a 4-3 one," Vagnozzi said.
Neighbors on Westhill Street looked to Murphy as a political harometer, too. "If it was anything political, they'd always check with John," Vagnozzi said.
Murphy grew up in a family of

Murphy grew up in a family of nine children and was proud of his Irish-Catholic heritage. He'd often tell his son how family members stuck up for one anoth-

er.
"That absolutely was the most important thing to him - his family," his son said.

He often related his experi-ences fighting in the Pacific dur-ing the war. He was part of the Marine invasion of Okinawa.

"As he got older that became more important to him," Tom said. "He was just extremely proud of being a Marine, fighting for his country and the comradeships he developed."


