There were some differences, of course. The Spartans weren't nearly as dominating as they were when they wen back-to-back titles in 1997-98, piling up two-straight undefeated seasons. They lost to Salem during the season, and were beaten by Rochester Adams in overtime in the state final. And yet, after losing 10 seniors to graduation in 1998, what Stevenson accomplished this year was nothing short of remarkable. Jim Kimble coached them to a 16-5-1 record (two of the losses coming against the Illinois state champion and runner-up) and to within a few minutes of a third-straight state title.

It wasn't a team lacking talent, to be sure. Stevenson had the state's best-player for the second-straight year in Andi Soid, a junior and team captain who anchored the Spartan defense from her sweeper position. Seid succeeded Allison Campbell (now at Tennessee) as Miss Soccer.

Still, it took an exceptional coaching job by Kimble for Stevenson to overcome early-season losses to Troy Athens and Salem. He deserves the acclaim.
