Goes told the council the system makes a real-time image of each fingerprint on a large screen, thus enabling police to see and immediately correct bad images before they are recorded.
We get a perfect print every time," he said unlike the smudged prints that can happen via ink-and-card.
Furthermore, Goes said, the system searches a national database and "We should be able to get clearance on a person within 20 minutes."

The faster speed of the Livescan system "can significantly reduce a community's liability regarding false arrest claims," Lauhoff said.
