Patterson said he believes that



Automation Alley was formed around a nucleus of 45 high-tech companies, but since the launch of the project in November 1998, four new members have been added which include the Oak-

land Press, Lawrence Technological University, Piorberg Instruments and Excel Technical Solutions. In addition, 15 other new candidates are waiting to be approved for membership in the consortium.
