Hartsock returns as interim middle school principal

Hattacek retired as Walled Lake Contrai High School's principal at the end of
last school year. A popular leador with
students and parents, the 64-year-old
Hartacek served as the school's principal
for four years.

Now he's agreed to be the interim principal at Clifford Smart Middle School.
The position was vacated in July by
Jamelie McGuire, who was named principal of Walled Lake Western High.

"I love middle school kids. I can hardly
wait," asid Hartseck, a gregarious man
with a loud laugh and a friendly manner.

The Walled Lake Board of Education
approved Hartseck's temporary role at its
Thursday njalt meeting.

"It's an interim position. It's not a longterm thing," said school district
spokenwoman Lois Lange. "He likes middle school and he's agreed to do it."

Hartseck said he volunteeerd for the joh
after no one else applied for it.

"I know that they couldn't possibly go
outside (the district) and find somebody
at this point in the school year," he said.

Lange said the appointment will allow
school officials to conduct a tuil-scale
search for a new principal. That search

"This isn't the hiring soason for administrators," Lange said. "They don't start looking (for a new job) during the first semester."

Before landing at Contral, the charismatic Hartsock served one year as Howell High School's principal. Before that, he was a middle school principal in Alaska for 16 years.

But as a high school student in Indiana, Hartsock said he graduated near the bottom of his class. He found school to be boring.

"I hated school. I was really a terrible student," he said. If it wasn't for his good SAT scores, he probably wouldn't have been admitted to college, he said.

But Hartsock went on to earn bachclor's and master's degrees in education from Indiana Univorsity, He's also attended Oregon State, the University of Alaska and Harvard University.
