St. Fablam was established as a parish in 1957 and as a school eight years later.





She also credited construction contractor Barton Malow of Southfield and architect Giffels, Hoyem and Basso of Troy for their efforts in retooling the building. "The children have no hazards here," Loretelle said. "There's no dust flying, we're very fortunate. "... Nothing has been omitted in this school. We have first-quality everything, every code, every regulation. It's equipped for the handicapped. Everything you need is right here."

Playground space was not curtailed to make room for the new portion of the school, Loretelle said. Another 50 parking spaces were added to the lot.

About half of the project's \$7.6 million price tag was raised by parishioners' donations; the other half was borrowed from the Archdiocese of Detroit.

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
