

Harrison keeps Borgess winless by turning back rally

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When Farmington Hills Harrison girls basketball coach Pete Mantyla discussed Redford Bishop, Borgess before Thursday's

non-league matchup, "winless" wasn't one of the adjectives he used.

The Spartans brought a winning tradition into Harrison's gym, winning three of the last six Class C state championships. They are talented, quick and

aggressive, and well coached. Borgess led it to four formidable non-league teams, including Overland's Plymouth Canton, and for Harrison to be the fifth Mantyla knew it would take one of the Hawks' better efforts.

Harrison led most of the way and didn't fold when Borgess made a final push, winning 57-60 to improve to 4-2 overall.

"This is the best team we've beaten," Mantyla said. "They are really aggressive and physical and I thought tonight was our best night in terms of getting a lot out of everyone."

The points were well distributed for the Hawks, who made 11 of 20 field goal attempts in the second half. Senior guard Emily Jackson led with 16 points, followed by junior guard Becky Zak with nine and 10 rebounds and sophomore guard Aynna Richmond and junior guard Kelly Taylor with eight points each.

The Hawks scored six of the final seven points after Borgess'

guard Michelle Catchings scored on a steal and layup to end a 29-29 tie and cut the lead to 61-49 with 3:15 left.

Richmond made consecutive short-range jump shots and senior guard Gayle Ternes, who finished with seven points, split two free throws to put the Hawks up 58-49 with about two minutes left.

Richmond's baskets came in the half-court offense but they weren't exactly drawn on the chalkboard.

"They are so tough defensively it was hard to run a set play against them," Mantyla said. "It was more heater-skeeter than anything. Aynna has the ability to score."

Jackson scored seven points in the first half and eight in the second and more importantly, took control of the ball when the ball-hawking Spartans were try-

ing to mount a comeback.

"When it's down to crunch time it's important to have someone to take over and keep everyone's head in the game, it's like 'panic attack,'" said Jackson, who also had seven rebounds.

"I thought it was one of her better games," Mantyla said.

The Spartans held a 41-31 rebounding advantage but shot only 21-of-60 from the floor.

Catchings was the only Spartan in double figures with 12 points. Sophomore forwards Jodi Clayburn and Rachelle Hampton added eight points each and junior forward Stacey Cobbs contributed seven.

Harrison built its biggest lead, 36-26, midway through the third quarter before Borgess made a run, scoring 10 of the next 14 points to cut the deficit to 39-35.

Borgess coach Dave Mann was assessed a technical foul for arguing a call and Ternes split the free throws to put the Hawks up 40-35 heading into the fourth.

The Spartans were called for

22 fouls compared to Harrison's 17. The most disturbing one for Mann came with 1.0 seconds left in the first half when Ternes was fouled more than 30 feet from the basket in the act of shooting, drawing three foul shots.

She made all three to give Harrison a 27-20 halftime lead.

"I thought we did a horrendous job adjusting to the way the game was called," Mann said. "We have no control over whether the game is going to be called tight or loose. Our kids can't seem to distinguish between denial and help position on defense. Everyone is in denial, no one is in help."

The Spartans better change their ways quickly with state ranked Dearborn Divine Central first on the Catholic League Central Division schedule.

"Everyone's out for themselves and we're not working hard in practice," Taylor said. "Oh and five is not how we're supposed to be."

McComb, Russell spur Raiders to cage win

Scoring two points in a quarter will kill you — unless you can come up with a pair of 23s.

That's the formula host North Farmington used Thursday to drub Walled Lake Western, 56-30, in a Western Lakes Activities Association matchup.

Samantha McComb had her usual outstanding game for the Raiders with 21 points, seven assists, five steals, five rebounds and two blocked shots. Just another day on the hardwood.

Staci Russell backed her up with a 16-point game plus 10 steals and six rebounds. Christina Colombo scored eight points.

"Russell had an outstanding game," Coach Linda Perkins said. "All 10 players contributed, and that's pretty cool."

"I pulled McComb and Russell and everybody else finished good. They played hard for 32 minutes."

"I value that. That's what I ask for of my kids."

North Farmington squashed Western in the first quarter 23-4, but its second-quarter dip meant the Raiders' halftime lead was down to 25-11. A 23-8 third period restored the lead.

North is now 4-2 overall and 2-0 in the Western Lakes. Walled Lake Western, 1-3 and 0-2.

Farmington Hills Mercy handled visiting Riverview Gabriel Richard, 62-54, Thursday in a Detroit Catholic League game.

"It was a slow-paced game," Coach Kristin Wright of the Marlinas said. "We didn't really pick it up until the second half."

Carrie Brankiewicz scored 12 points to lead the Blazers with Alexis Dunn getting 11 and Nuverre Naami eight.

Mercy (4-1) held an 18-10 lead after the first quarter and a 31-26 margin at halftime. After three periods, it was up by 11, 46-35.

Weber scored on a two-yard run in the first quarter only to see the Raiders take their only lead of the game in the second.

Junior quarterback Blair Weiss threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to Brian Johns and Zach Lessway kicked the only extra point that was converted all night to give North Farmington a 7-0 lead.

That lead lasted into the third

quarter, when Michael Addison scooted 39 yards to score and give Farmington back the lead for good. The two-point run try failed.

QB Weber bolted 40 yards to hike the lead to 18-7, which is what the score remained when the two-point pass try failed.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN ZONING AMENDATORY ORDINANCE ORDINANCE NO. C-13-99 PCAS 10-99

An Ordinance to amend the City Code, Chapter 94, Zoning Chapter, of the City of Farmington Hills, to amend Section 34.32 to reclassify certain property as hereinafter mentioned:

The City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby ordains:

Section 1. That the City Code of the City of Farmington Hills, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, be hereby amended in part to amend Section 34.32 to reclassify certain property in the City as follows: to show RA-1, Single-Family Residential District classification, and RA-1B, Single-Family Residential District classification where RA-2, Single-Family Residential District classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

A part of the Northeast 1/4 of Section 13, T1N, R9E, City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan. The area to be reclassified includes Duke's Forestbrook Hills No. 1, Duke's Forestbrook Hills, Pebblebrook Estates Subdivisions and adjacent property. The property is located south of Twelve Mile Road, west side of Inkster Road.
RA-2 to RA-1B Sidwell 223-13-261-001 thru 010; 22-13-262-001 thru 012; 22-13-263-001 thru 008; 22-13-401-001, RA-2 to RA-1B Sidwell 223-13-252-013; 22-13-206-014-018; 22-13-226-008 thru 020, 021, 002, 003, 004, 022, 006, 007; 22-13-227-031, 032, 003 thru 010, 027 thru 030, 024, 025; 22-13-253-007 thru 018; 22-13-277-001 thru 023; 22-13-276-001, 002, 005 thru 018; 22-13-426-002, 003.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect twenty-one days after their enactment.

Section 4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Council Members of the City of Farmington Hills, at a duly called meeting held on the 13th day of September, 1999, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
