

# Raiders tie for 2nd place in tennis

Some people get ties for Father's Day, some receive them for Christmas, some on their birthdays and some get ties after the Western Lakes Activities Association conference tennis tournament.

Northville swamped the field as expected Tuesday, winning every flight — save No. 4 singles — while Livonia Stevenson and North Farmington deadlocked for second.

Northville finished with 30 points; North and Stevenson collecting 18 apiece to outdistance fourth-place Farmington.

"One of our goals — well, Northville was definitely the strongest team in the league," North coach Norm Stanislawski said. "It was between us and Stevenson for second place, and it went right down to the wire."

"We had a chance to come in second without the tie if we had won our dual meet. And we had a good chance in the meet."

Whether the Spartans would take second place all alone or share it with the Raiders came down to the No. 4 singles final between Julie Maltzman of North and Stevenson's Jillian Bohn. Maltzman won, 7-5, 6-4.

"In fairness to Bohn," coach Frank Dotson of Stevenson said, "it was her fourth match of the day. Plus, she'd played Monday and gone 8-6, 10-8."

"So that's five sets in 24 hours. She was really tired. That was the difference, I think, between us having (second) outright and North Farmington tying."

"Most of our seeds came out the way we expected. We had an upset early, which cost us two

points, but that happens.

"If we played it again, who knows which way it would have turned out. North Farmington is a very strong team."

"Northville is obviously very strong, ranked sixth in Division II."

"Her match was very pivotal," Stanislawski said. "She had to win in order for us to tie."

Stevenson's Erin Maxson lost in the finals at No. 1 singles and "played very good tennis,"

Stanislawski said. "Our second singles, Amy Berke, played very well. She lost to a stronger, more experienced player."

Berke lost, 6-1, 5-1, in the No. 2 singles final. Farmington's Brittany Nuccitelli lost in the No. 3 singles final.

Stevenson's No. 1 doubles team of Jeanette Fershtman and Julie Yambaaky made it to the

finals and the Spartans' No. 2 team of Janice Tanzo and Kim Samsel did the same. Stephanie Mucci and Jenny Jensen were second of No. 4 doubles.

"I think we played very well," Dotson said. "It's just that Northville is a little bit stronger than we are at this point."

"We improved as the season progressed," Stanislawski said.

Notice of Adoption of Ordinance C-14-99-E, an Ordinance to amend the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 30, Motor Vehicles, Sections 30-319 and 30-319.7 concerning operating a motor vehicle under influence of alcoholic liquor and refusing to take chemical test to confirm the provisions to state law and increase the penalties thereof.

**Section 1.**

Section 30.319, Chapter 30, Traffic and Motor Vehicles of the City Code is hereby amended.

Section 30.319 Operating under influence of alcoholic liquor or controlled substance; operating with unlawful alcohol content; operating while visibly impaired; alcohol content of minors; attempts; penalties. (a) - (r)

**Section 2.**

Section 30.319.7, Chapter 30, Traffic and Motor Vehicles of the City Code is hereby amended.

Section 30.319.7 Duties of Peace Officer if person refuses chemical test or if test reveals unlawful alcohol content. (a) - (d)

**Section 3.** Savings.

**Section 7.** Effective Date.
