Drunkon and reckless drivers have more to fee. from police and the courts under a package of laws that took effect oft. 1.


"We're putting the brakes on drunken driving while sending a strong message that repeated drunk and reckless driving will be treated as the heinous crimes they are," said state Sen. Loren Bennett, R-Canton, in a press release.

The "Repeat Offender" package targets drivers with two or more alcohol-related driving convictions within seven years or vehicle may be sold to effect the may b

mandatory substance abuse treatment.

Drivers with suspended licenses will be prosecuted for a five-year felony for involvement in an injury-causing accident and a 15-year felony for involvement in an accident causing death.

Anyone who knowingly allows a driver with a suspended license to use their vehicle will be charged with a two-year felony for injury-causing accidents and a five-year felony for accidents causing death.


