

Teachers Attend State Conference

Several Farmington educators will attend a conference Nov. 14 and 15 on human relations in education in Michigan schools.

Joseph Nicita, director of secondary education, Public Forge, principal at Knabrook School, Mrs. Bernadine Blosser and Mrs. Jean Hough, representing the Farmington staff, Mrs. Juan Rico, audio visual, and several district-wide delegates will participate in the state-wide conference in the Lansing Civic Center.

There will be "Not by Talk Alone."

Dr. Samuel DeWitt Proctor, dean of special projects at the University of Wisconsin will deliver the keynote address.

He is the author of "The Young Negro in America 1960-1980."

Students from several Michigan high schools will conduct a panel on their own concerns and feelings about human relations.

"Museums for Teaching, Dead or Alive?" will be the topic of an address by Nathaniel Dixon of Washington D.C.'s Smithsonian Institute. "In Industry and the Crisis in Human Relations" will be dealt with by James Tomes, vice president of the Bell and Howell Corporation.

Dr. Paul Witt, professor of education at Michigan State University will discuss "Technology, Teaching, and Human Values," and the MOREL staff (Michigan-Ohio Regional Educational Laboratory) will address themselves to the topic "What Needs to be Done in Michigan Schools About Human Relations."

The conference is sponsored jointly by the Michigan Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, the Michigan Audio-Visual Association and the Michigan Association of School Librarians.

District Court Rules Must Be Adopted

When 1969 officially begins on Jan. 1, the existing City of Farmington's Municipal Court will be abolished.

In its place will be the new District Court, established by the state under the terms of the lower court reorganization. Farmington—both city and township—will be served by the same court. Under the terms of the bill, the court will be held three days a week in the township and two days a week in the city.

Voters Buck Trend In State Ed Posts

Farmington voters went against state-wide voting trends Tuesday in races for the State Board of Education and the governing bodies of Michigan's three largest universities.

Farmington voters endorsed Republican candidates for all eight seats at stake, while Democrats upset two Republicans in capturing all education posts on the ballot.

Oakland County voters also favored all Republicans for all education posts.

MICHAEL DEEB, a Highland Park Community College instructor, was elected to a vacancy on the State Board of Education. Carmen L. DeLuca, of Houghton, did not seek reelection.

Marilyn J. Kelly, currently vice president of the state board, was reelected to an eight year term. She is a faculty member at Eastern Michigan University and has served on the board since 1964.

Kelly and Deeb won over Mrs. Barbara Dumouchelle, of Grosse Pointe, and James Tan Brink, of Muskegon.

Bronson Carries Farmington Election

Farmington voters followed the state and county trend in electing a judge to the State Court of Appeals Tuesday and followed Oakland County voters in their choice for a State Supreme Court Justice.

Michael D. O'Hara, who carried Oakland County, lost in the state-wide contest to Thomas G. Kavanagh. Final returns on the local level were: Oakland county, 14,702 township, 6,822 and city, 1,909.

Kavanagh, county, 103,121 township, 5,089; and city, 1,351.


S. Jerome Bronson won the race for the additional seat on the Second District Court of Appeals.
