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## Bates is Hills mayor in landslide



Nancy Bates is the new Hills elected mayor, trouncing challenger George Sarkisian out of the running. She took 80 percent of the vote.

Nancy Bates left ire tracks that her automotive analyst
opponent would have needed an odometer to measure.
Bates rolled over George Sarkisian – a Ford Motor Co.
warranty analyst – by garnering 30 percent of the vote in
Tuesday's Farmington Hills mayoral race. Bates succeeds
Aldo Vagnozzi, who couldn't run because of term limits.
The 10-year city council member had four-fifths of the
absentee vote. Her support continued to pile up at the polls
where only 16 percent of the city's electivate turned out/
Tve been here for a long time," Bates said during a celebration at San Marino Golf Course's Off the Tee restaurant. "I think people have understood and appreciated the
things I've tried to do and the things I've accomplished."

The former legislative aids to state Rep. Jan Dolan had the backing of council collesgues and much of the area's political movers. She was endorsed by the Farmington Area Republican Club and other groups.

Same of these helping on her campaign included: Farmington School Beard member Cathy Webb, former Hills councilwoman JoAnne Smith, former Farmington Children and Family Foundation Chairman Richard Duguanne and former Hills City Manager Bill Costick.

By contrast, Sarkisian ran as an outsider.

His proposed 10-acre, self-titled "George Sarkisian Fields of Freedom" animal park didn't galvanize support. Neither did his attacks on Mayer Aldo Vagnozzi, who he said was "pompous."

"pompous."
Sarkisian also criticized Bates for her condoning former councilmun Terry Sever's position as a consultant to a developer, who was bidding on a city project. The developer later withdrew from consideration.

"I was very disappointed that the candidates forums had such a negative tone," Bates said. "I was very offended by his attacks on Aldo. They were uncalled for and inaccu-

### Incumbents returned

Five of six precincts in Farmington were counted. There was no doubt city council incumbents William Hartsock, JoAnne McShane and James Mitchell would prevail over challenger Stephen Dibert. But the incumbents wouldn't congratulate each other until the final totals were in at Farmington City Hall.

"You never know," said an obviously relieved Hartsock moments after the results were announced. "You just ... don't

... know. You can't take it (victory) for granted," said Hartsock, a 26-year council member.

Faced with Farmington's first contested city council election since 1993, the winning candidates gave a collective sigh of relief.
'Tm happy it's over,' said McShane, the top vote-getter with 805 votes. She won a four-year term, as did Hartsock, who collected 762 votes. Third-place finisher Mitchell earned a two-year term with 675 votes, while Dibert trailed with 279 votes.

#### Voters approve amendments

Tuesday's overwhelming approval at the polls of three amendments to Farmington's city charter did not surprise JoAnne McShane.

McShane, one of three incumbents restected to the city council, said the wide margin of victory for the ballot proposals indicated that "the voters are confident we know what we're doing. They're showing their support" by approving the amendments.

All three proposals received at least 73 percent of the total 968 votes cast. The city has 7,694 registered voters. Following is breakdown of how each proposal fared:

E Charter Amendment 1, to increase the annual salary of the mayor and council members from \$900 to \$1,800; yes, 737 (77.2 percent); no, 218 (22.8 percent).

E Charter Amendment 2, to drop from three years to one year the residency requirement for those interested in serving on city boards and commissions; yes, 746 (78.1 percent); no, 209, (21.9 percent).

### Council, mayor get pay hike

Farmington Hills voters decided to give the city's elected officials a raise but also said any to three other proposed charter amendments

city's elected with a second control of the three other proposed charter amendments Tuesday.

Proposal A passed with 59 percent of the electorate in a 5,216-3,676 vote. Hills council members' salaries will increase from \$1,800 to \$5,000, while the mayor's pay rate goes from \$2,700 to \$7,500.

The pay increase is the first since 1973; when the city charter was drafted. Voters supported what were largely viewed as changes to keep up with the times.
