

POLICE AND FIRE NEWS

The following are police and fire reports made during the past week in Farmington and Farmington Hills.

SEXUAL ASSAULT

In Farmington Hills: Police are investigating a complaint by a 14-year-old girl who said a 15-year-old boy fondled her and tried to make her perform oral sex while at a friend's house Oct. 30. The girl was at a friend's home doing homework when three boys arrived.

ASSAULT

In Farmington Hills: A party on the 27900 block of Trailwood Court turned into a melee in which two teens were hit with a tire iron and broken bottle Oct. 30. At 9:25 p.m., police arrived after someone reported a fight in the street. A homeowner told officers he was supervising a party for his daughter when three teens from Walled Lake Western became unruly. After being told to leave, one of the teens struck another twice in the back of the head with a tire iron. The victim, 19, was taken to Henry Ford Hospital in West Bloomfield. Medics treated another teen for cuts on his arm after one assailant tried to stab him with a broken bottle, police reports said.

VANDALISM

In Farmington Hills: Someone slashed the convertible top on a 1992 Mercedes 500SL parked at Alfocino restaurant parked on the 39200 block of Grand River between 2 p.m. Oct. 30 and shortly after midnight Oct. 31.

A homeowner on the 22500 block of Calgate reported someone damaged Halloween decorations and wrote graffiti on the window screens around 1:45 a.m. Oct. 31.

Vandals threw two rocks through a windshield of a 1999 Mercury Mountaineer parked on the 30800 block of Country Ridge Circle the night of Oct. 30-31, causing \$1,000 damage. A resident nearby reported someone poured a chocolate powder into the gas tank of his 1999 GMC pickup the same night, causing \$500-\$1,000 damage.

A double-pane glass window

was broken on the 37600 block of Emerald Forest Oct. 30, causing \$450 damage.

A resident on the 3800 block of Country Ridge reported someone broke a window at his home for the second time in a month Oct. 31.

BREAK INS

In Farmington Hills: Someone broke the driver's side door window and stole a radar detector from a 1998 Honda parked at Sam's Club on Haggerty Road Oct. 31.

DRUNKEN DRIVING

In Farmington Hills: Police arrested a Dearborn Heights woman, 28, for drunken driving on Orchard Lake and 12 Mile around 1:10 a.m. Oct. 31. Officers questioned the driver of a 1998 Ford pickup after she ran a red light and braked suddenly. After putting the truck into reverse, she struck a vehicle behind her. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .16 percent. The legal limit is .10 percent.

Police arrested a Lincoln Park man, 46, for drunken driving and crack cocaine possession on

13 Mile and Greening at 7:10 p.m. Oct. 31. Authorities stopped the Pontiac Grand Am after the car was registered to a man with a suspended license. The driver smelled of alcohol, police reports said. Officers found a bottle of Jack Daniels whiskey, crack pipe and suspected crack cocaine inside the car. The man was taken to Botsford Hospital to have blood drawn.

STROM-ARMED ROBBERY

In Farmington Hills: A woman reported a couple

after a traffic accident on Grand River and Eight Mile around 6:20 a.m. Oct. 31. After the victim's 1999 Ford Contour was struck from behind, she pulled into a nearby lot. The driver of the car that hit hers began ranting about the accident. A woman passenger asked to use the victim's cellular phone to call work. The driver returned and grabbed the woman's purse. After he wrestled it away, he drove off west on Grand River, police reports said.

KIDNAP ASSAULT

Police arrested a man, 42, after he threatened another man with a 4-inch knife during a fight at the Knights Inn on Grand River around 9 p.m. Oct. 31. The two had been playing cards when they got into an argument, which turned into a fight. At one point, a man pulled out a knife and began chasing the other through the parking lot. No injuries were reported.

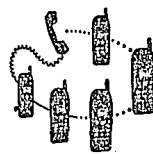
