

Sunday concert features noted pianist

The Detroit Alumni chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon will host a scholarship benefit concert at 3 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 7, in the North Congregational Church at 36520 W. 12 Mile Road in Farmington Hills. The church is between Drake and Halsted.

The featured artist will be Kazimierz Brzozowski, who made his New York debut in 1993 at Carnegie Hall. He plays piano and is particularly noted for the music of Chopin.

Brzozowski was awarded top prize in the prestigious National Chopin Competition in Warsaw, Poland, for three consecutive years as well as the National Keyboard Festival in Slupsk. He was invited to perform with the Polish National Radio Orchestra in the Warsaw Mozart Festival honoring the 200th anniversary of the composer's death.

Currently on the faculty of Oakland Community College, Orchard Ridge campus, Brzozowski has performed in Hungary, Yugoslavia, Japan and the U.S. He is also an assistant professor of music at Albion College.

A native of Lublin, Poland, Brzozowski studied at the famed Chopin Academy of Music in Warsaw.

There is no admission charge for Sunday's concert but donations are accepted with all proceeds going to music students in the form of scholarships.
