Another possible factor could be the increased use of the fire-place and the particles emitted into the air from burning wood. These particles might trritate the lungs, decreasing the amount of oxygen in the bloodstream and placing stress on the heart, said Kloner. It is clear that temperature doesn't explain everything, he said.

Combination of factors

"The higher coronary death rate during the winter months appears to be due to a combina-tion of factors. Clearly some of these factors are environmen-tal," Klener said. "The more we tal," Kloner said. "The more we understand about the factors that result in death from coronary disease the better we can treat them in the future."

The researchers studied 222,285 death certificates from

The researchers studied 22,285 death certificates from the Los Afgeles; Courty Experiment of Health Services Data Collection and Analysis Unit for deaths from coronary artory disease between 1985 and 1996. The monthly humber of deaths resulting from coronary artery disease was then averaged out over 12 years. The number of deaths was highest in December, with an average of 1,808 deaths, and in January with 1,925 deaths.
