As he prepared to talk to school children visiting the exhibit, the former NASA astronaut was anxious to see the artisat' impressions of his expenses. Saturn 5 booster rocket with its five F-1 engines. Stand back from Atilia Hejja's 1984 oil, "The Light Ship," to fully take in the breathtaking sight of Challenger's first night-launch. Hejja's dynamic painting

focuses on the vehicle thrusting skyward above the Kennedy Space Center.

Car Two records NASA's greatest achievements: the space shuttles Discovery, Atlantis and Endeavor, and the tragic loss of the seven members of the Challenger crew in 1986, Greg Mortz graphite drawing relays the sadness of the moment by depicting a shrouded spacecraft.
