Northwestern Highway extension gets attention

A preliminary engineering study of the proposed construc-tion of the Northwestern Con-

tion of the Northwestern Com-nector is expected to get under way in the next few weeks. The study, which is the next step in the process of bringing the project to fruition, became possible when the city of Farm-ington Hills agreed to adminis-ter the \$1.5 million project.

In addition to approving the
city's role in the study, the city
council Sept. 28 also voted to
award the contract to Snell Environmental Group Inc. of Lansion.

The connector consortium of Farmington Hills, West Bloomfield Township, the Oakland County Road Commission and the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) asket the Hills to administer the study because the road commission, which was originally slated to do it, is in a lawsuit over the fund-

ing and routing of it with MDOT.
The Northwestern Connector is to eventually extend Northwestern Highway north and west, where it will tie into the M-5/Haggerty Road Connector now under construction.
Called a "pre-preliminary engineering and environmental assessment" study, the project is expected to take about two years and will be financed with state and federal funding through MDOT, according to Hills Public Services Director Tom Biasell.
There are provisions for the city to recover some of the staff costs for administering the study, he said.
The study surpose, Biasell said, is to provide "a detailed analysis of actually how the proposed alignment of the Connector will work. This is called the 'early preliminary engineering phase."
Biasell said the public will become more aware of the study later on, when public forums and meetings are held.

However, additional funding of the reat of the early phase is in question at present, he said.

MDOT has pledged \$26 million to the early phase, he said, but "unfortunately, the alignment that was chosen" along Orchard Lake Road and Maple Road "has a preliminary estimate in excess of \$50 million."

Needed are sources of addi-tional funding for the entire early phase and "a prioritization of the different components," he

said.

The connector is to be a six-lane boulevard extension of Northwestern along Orchard Lake, with Maple Road west of that being widened to four lanes out to the M-5/Hoggerty connec-tor.

The original plan by MDOT was to extend Northwestern diagonally across West Bloom-field to M-59. That plan was acrapped when the township-changed its master plan, making the route no longer possible.

Police ticket 18 in Hills undercover tobacco sting

"They are not training their employees," said Police Chief Bill Dwyer.

Under federal law and city ordinance – that went into effect July 6 – retailers are required to ask for identification for anyone younger than 27 who asks to buy tobacco products.

Dwyer capressed disappointment in the 18 retailers who were ticketed for a misdeneamer. The local penalty, which is tougher than that imposed under state law, carries a maximum \$500 fine and 90 days in jail.
