Competency test ordered in murder for hire case

A preliminary exam for the woman accused of hiring a hitman has been postponed, pend-ing a forensic exam.

Cable television subscribers in Farm-ington, Farmington Hills and Novi aren't the only ones who may be feeling frustrated by next year's rate increas-

frustrated by next year's rate increas-es. The consortium that governs local access rates for the three cities says it's still trying to figure out if this year's increase was appropriate. If it's not, says the Southweatern Oakland Cable Cambission (SWOCC), Time Warner Cable may owe a refund to subscribers. However, Time Warner insists its fig-ures are correct.
