## Hawks down Chargers; Marlin's edge Spartans

Farmington Harrison had some needed help from unexpected sources Thursday in a 49-38 win over visiting Livonia Churchill in girls basketball.

The Hawks haven't depended on the post position for many of their points this season, but Zak provided a welcome 13 points, as well as 10 rebounds.

"We had a good game out of our post players, and it was a night we really needed them to come through," Harrison coach Pate Mynly said.

"Because of foul trouble, we had some combinations of people on the floor who were not used to playing together, but we got good minutes out of Clara Colbert and Cassie Jamison as well."

An All's game-high 17 points included four three-point field goals and 5-of-8 shooting at the free-throw line.

She made three triples in the second half when the Hawks outscored the Chargers 28-17 to account for the 11-point margin of victory. The game was tied at halftime, 21-21.

Kelly Taylor had 10 points and six rebounds for Harrison. Blashfield seven points and five rebounds. Emily Jackson and Zak six points and five rebounds apiece.

Kersten Konrion scored 12 points and Karen Kramer nine for the Chargers. Stacey Supanich had 10 rebounds.

"We played hard and didn't give up," Churchill coach Dave Balog said, adding Harrison is a disciplined team. "They knocked time off the clock, and we had to

go to a man-to-man defense." Harrison made seven triples, Churchill none. The Chargers made 12 of 20 free throws, the Hawks eight of 20.

"They have nice team size, and they're a tough, athletic team," Mynly said of the Chargers. "We really had to work for it. They play hard and they're going to present some problems for people as they did us."

The Hawks are 8-3 overall, 4-1 in the Western Lakes Activities Association. The Chargers are 6-5 and 2-3.

**MERCY 50, BORGESS 49:** Farmington Hills Mercy built a comfortable halftime lead and held off a fourth quarter rally by Redford Bishop Borgess on Friday to win a Catholic League Central Division game at home.

Borgess missed a three-point shot in the final seconds that would have forced overtime, and a publish before the buzzer sounded by Joel Guburn tied the Spartans one point shy.

Mercy improved to 6-6 overall, 2-4 in the Central Division. Borgess fell to 5-6 overall, 3-3 in the Central.

Carrie Blankiewicz led Mercy with 16 points. Teammate Susie Robie added eight.

Salem's Lindsey Klemmer added 10 points. Michelle Catchings and DeShawna Hoskins added 10 each, and star Tiffany Simon was held to eight.

Mercy led 29-17 at halftime before Borgess outscored the Marlin's 15-12 in the third and 17-9 in the fourth to get close.

The visiting Vikings took advantage of Samantha McCombs' absence in the fourth quarter Thursday to expand on a 11-point lead in the final eight minutes.

McCombs, who scored 15 points for the Raiders, didn't play in the fourth quarter because of back spasms.

The Vikings led 26-18 at halftime, and 25 after three quarters. Central outscored North in the final period, 18-7.

"We played hard; we just didn't have the staying power," North coach Linda Perkins said. "They were the better team tonight, but we gave it our best shot."

said Malinowski, who conducted the varsity practice Thursday.

"It's an opportunity for him to get back in baseball, and can you pass up an opportunity like that?" he thought so. It's hard for us, but high schools don't pay coaches what they do in the major leagues.

In the interim, Mercy assistant Katie Vokal will coach the Marlin's. Vokal, 25, is eight months pregnant, too.

"I told her she has to hold on until the other coach comes back," Malinowski said.

"Emotionally and mentally, she'll be able to handle it. She can't go running up and down the court, but other than that she'll be OK."

Vokal, a graduate of Midland High School and Alma College, said she was up to the task. She took over the coaching reins Friday when the Marlin's were host to Redford Bishop Borgess.
