Livonia Clarenceville kept its Metro Conference title hopes alive Friday, surviving a three-hour, 19-minute marathon game with visiting Hamtramek to emerge a 52-40 winner.

The Trojans improved to 5-1 overall and 4-1 in the conference. The Cosmos dropped to 4-2 overall and 3-2 in the Metro.

"We still think we have a great chance," said sophomore Scut Wion, who had three touchdowns and a pair of two-point conversions. "We have to make sure we take care of business next week."
