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# Master the 'jewels' of the beauty trade

hen I speak to women, a universal question rears its ugly head within five minutes – How can I get beautiful makeup in the least amount of time possible?\*

Shortcuts. Everyone wants shortcuts. Interestingly, I tried some shortcuts on a friend. I did a "basic" makeup using several products. Then I did
my normal, professionally complete
makeup using everything necessary.

Total difference in
time? Exactly two
minutes!



This month I'll explain the necessities for your daily makeup routine. Keep in mind, it takes more to look like leas. Why? Blending, Blending, Blending.

These are your foundation's foundation. First you close your pores with the freshener, then you hydrate your skin with the moisturizor. Use very little of each. The skin is like a sponge. Once it reaches its porosity, that's it.

Foundation, I only use and manufacture liquid base. I find that it will not get where you don't want it to get. Also, throw away those filthy makeup sponges and use a Q-tip.

Under eye concealer. Not that anyone needs it! This liquid is applied just in the orbit of the eye. Always use a liquid, not a cake. Remember, this goes on after your makeup base.

Cream rouge or blusher? Both!
You want your color to stay on, don't
you? Cream rouge is used first, dotted
on the cheekbone. Set with powdered
blusher to maintain your color intensity all day.

Tweezers. A proper brow begins parallel with the tear duct. In other words, go straight up in a vertical line from the tear duct and tweeze out any hairs that approach your bridge.

Brush-on brow color, Not eye-row pencil, Just feather the powder n to fill in the gaps.

Neutral powdered eye shadows. After applying what I call shadow seal, use several earth tones on the lid and surrounding areas to give depth and clarity to your eyes.

Eye pencils. Don't be afraid of them. They can delineate your eyes like nothing else. Use your lashes as your guideline: That's where the color goes. No wings!

Mascara. Try applying black mas-cara from the inside out. Horizontally. That way you will "fan" them without sticking them together.

Powder. Set your makeup with loss powder. When you apply it, use a major sable brush and "dust" it on, don't "wipe" it on. Carry a pressed compact with you throughout the day to touch up. to touch up.

Lipliner pencils. Clearly outline your existent lip line. Use a basic earth tone. You are not supposed to see the lipliner. It's supposed to keep your lipstick from bleeding.

Lipstick and gloss. Use an indefi-nite color. No primaries for our daily chores. Combine the lipstick and gloss on the same sable lip brush and fill in where you have drawn your lip line. Do not blot. Lick you lips to set color.

Brushes. The number-one most important asject of makeup. If you learn how to blend with your brushes and your fingers, you will be home free.

Makeup application should not take longer than ten minutes. Practice makes presentable. Lots of practice makes perfect. Good luck, and if you need help, call mo.


## Sweater weather
