$Falcons\ earn$ 3-2 triumph $over\ Raiders$

Having the final say in their rivalry with North Farmington, the Falcons are district as well as city champions in boys soccer.

"It was one of the best games we've played all year," coach Luke Juncaj said, adding the Falcons are believed to be the first Farmington school to win a district tournament. "It was the starters, the subs; everybody was having a great game." Farmington's 4-3, double-overtime win over Dearborn Heights Crestwood in its first district game helped to motivate the Falcons for the final, according to Juncaj.

The Raiders had the momentum initially, but the Falcons, who were 12-5-3 heading into regional play Wednesdny, railied and later secred the all-important first goal.

"To their credit, once they realized they had a fight on their hands, they really stiffened and came at us," North coach Ron Meteyer said. They moved diagnosally better than us, and they were winning all the 50-60 balls. By halftime we had dug ourselves a hole."

The Raiders narrowed the difference to one goal when senior Viktor Juncaj secred in the 30th minute on a 40-yard kick into the wind.

"It left his foot like a rocket, but the wind held it up and it dropped down into the goal." Meteyer said. 'I think the goalie thought it was going to go over the top. It was kind of a funny goal, but funny ones count, too." Farmington regained the two-goal advantage just a minute later. Wayne's free kick from 40 yards found its way into the upper-right corner of the net.

"There were several people in front of their goalie, and I don't think he ever saw it until it was in the goal," Juncaj said.

With a 3-1 halftime lead, the Falcons were full of confidence and encouraged by their first-

"We controlled the game in North Farmington's end; we kept the pressure on their defense, and we had seoring chances," Juneus said. "That was our strategy for the game, so they couldn't get much offense against us and it worked out very well." Farmington continued to control the game and maintained 3-1 lead until North junior Brian Horr scored with two minutes left in the game, intercepting a goal-kick and firing a shot that deflected off a defender.

"In the second half, we still kopt playing like we were down or it was a tie," Juneaj said. "We were able to keep the hall in their half, and they weren't able to develop any offense.
