Prison or heart transplant? Hills woman waits and wonders

At the Farmington Hills home where she remains under house arrest, Mindy Brass keeps a small bag — containing toiletries and a few essentials — at the

"That bag is always packed," said Brass, and I'm rendy to go."

The question is, however, will Brass go back to prison, or to the University of Michigan Medical Center where she's on the list for a heart transplant." "I've quit smoking." Brass said Friday, "and I've been watching my diet. They tell me that because of my blood type (AB positive) and my size G foot, 3 inches and 125 pounds), I'm a good candidate for a transplant."

A hearing Wednesday before

A hearing Wednesday before Oakland Circuit Judge Rudy Nichols could go a long way

toward determining where Brass will go back to the Scott Correctional Facility in Plymouth or to Ann Arbor for a new heart and a new chance at a healthy life.

The hearing will address five separate motions — two from prosecutors and three from defense attorneys — pertaining to Brass' new trial, scheduled to begin Nov. 2.

Brass could be summoned to Ann Arbor before then. U of M officials have assured her there's no direct connection between her cligibility for a heart transplant and her status as an accused drug dealer.

Nonetheless, Wednesday's hearing is a milestone in her life. On the advice of her attorneys, Brass Friday declined to talk about her upcoming court dates. But attorneys on both sides say they are confident.

"They convicted my client on

the testimony of a liar and a drug dealer," said Marquerite A. Hanes, co-counsel with Henry M. Scharg. "And we're prepared to challenge that testimony." Oakland County assistant prosecutor Beth M. Hand said the main witness against Brass, William R. Leflet, has been contacted and is ready to testify. "I'm confident the evidence will lend to a guilty werdiet."

Leflet and another irmsted, lemil Mardelli, were arrested in Troy on Dec. 7, 1991, after they tried to sell a kilo of cocinie to undercover police. They subsequently implicated Brass and two other California residents, Michael Toller and Daniel Soloron.

Solomon. Brass, Mardenli and Solomon were all sentenced to life in prison under Michigan's drug-lifer law mandating life in prison for anyone convicted of traffick-ing in 650 or more grams of

conine or heroin — although Solomon's conviction was over-turned.
Toller was turned over to fed-eral authorities and Lefle, in exchange for his testimeny, was allowed to plead guilty to a less-er charge. Leflet was released from prison after about two years.
Brass served almost seven years in prison, with little hope

Brinss served almost seven years in prison, with little hope for parole, until July when Judge Nichols, who presided over her original trial, ordered a new trial. Nichols said defense atterneys should have had access to information, that would have enabled them to challenge the credibility of Leflet.

As a prosecution witness, Leflet gave contradictory testimony, according to Brass' attorneys who say that should be grounds for dismissal of charges against their client.
