A chapter of history will end today when the starting gates at Middlebelt and Schoolcraft Road open for the last time.

It's the final day of live racing at Ladbroke Detroit Race Course, whose management says it cannot compete with other forms of gambling, particularly the Windsor casino and the coming Detroit casinos.

The closing of Michigan's only all-thoroughbred track leaves sentimental regulars reminiscing, and employees, horse awarers, trainers and jockeys looking of other jobs and thoroughbred vances.

The track's founding propelled what was then Livonian Township toward cityhood in 1950, the same year it opened. Incorporating as a city let Livonia benefit from track revenues through the state. Ladbroke, based in Great Britain, bought the track in 1955.

The 194-acre site was sold in March, for \$30 million, to a group of developers who plan commercial and industrial complex, Millennium Park. Ladbroke will be open through the end of the year for simulcasting of races from tracks around the country, but demolition of some buildings is expected to begin later this month.

The shutdown has Mike Corbett of Livonia shaking his head.

"Even the small metro markets have a thoroughbred races," said Corbett, who along

with his wife, Phyllis, owns The Tout, a track concession and an information center for regular horse players.

The Tout, hased at Ladbroke for five years, will move to Northville Downs, a hurness-racing track.

Corbett wonders why Ladbroke couldn't make a go of it in Livonia. "It's probably the most vibrant corner in the whole metro area," he said.

Other tracks in the state offer mostly harness racing, which involves standard-bred horses. In thoroughbred racing, jockeys ride the borses.

Plans are under way for a thoroughbred track in Muskegon next year, and some borse owners, trainers and jockeys are betting on that, and Ladbroke track announcer Sam McKee.

But Shirley Johnson Singh of Detroit, who ewns seven racing throughbreds, said she and her husband. Sher Singh, are moving to Kentucky to be near a track there.

"It's heart-breaking," Singh said of Ladbroke, said it has been a place where people of all types rub elbows and share their interesting results of the said in the second content of the said that the second content is reason.
