## Deer hunters ready for start of firearm season



The forests and fields of Michigan will be bursting with blaze orange on Sunday morning as the 1998 firearms deer season gets underway one-half hours before sunrise. Upwards of 7.6.0 0.00

hunters are expected to hunt during the 1998 season and expectations are running high for another exceptional season.

oxpectations are running might for another exceptional season. There were an estimated 1.8 million deer in Michigan as of Oct. 1, which is about the same as last year. During the 1997 seasons combined (firearms, muzzleloading and archery) hunters took a total of 478,725 deer. Gun hunters took 159,148 bucks and 110,025 does. Bow hunters took 62,311 bucks and 64,202 does and muzzleloaders took 8,973 bucks and 14,579 does (the reminder were taken with late anticrless season and through crop damage and block permits). Estimates for this year's har-

Estimates for this year's harvest are similar with gun hunters expected to take 139,000 bucks and 119,000 does.

Here are 10 tips to help increase your success during the upcoming firearms deer season.

1. Dress for the weather. Noting will send you packing for camp faster than cold fingers or toes or a chill that won't go away. If you have a long hike your blind, carry some of the extra clothes you'll need or tipyour outer jacket around your waist. Dress in layers so if the temperature climbs you can shed a layer or two and still remain comfortable.

2. Be sure your gun is sighted in. Just because it was hitting dead-on last fall doesn't mean it is still hitting where you want. Take the time to run a few shots through your gun to be sure your sights and/or scope is on.

3. Don't take ill-advised shots. Be absolutely sure of your target and what's beyond it and don't

Muzzleloading season is , 4-13 in the Upper Peninsula and Dec. 11-20 in the Lower Peninsula.The late antieriess season is Dec. 19 Jan.3 on pri-Dec. 4-33 in the Upper Peninsula and Dec. 11-20 in the Lower Peninsula. The late antierless season is Dec. 19 Jan. 3 on private land in some areas of the state.

In Deer Management Unit 455 the early antierless season was Oct. 17-26 and the late antierless season is Dec. 11-Jan. 3. \* Many deer hunters participate in more than one season. Approximately 800,000 individuals are expected to hunt der.

As part of the DNR's program
to monitor bovine tuberculosis in
white-tailed deer hunters taking
deer in Alpena, Montmorency,
Oacoda, Alcoma or Presque Isle
counties nre asked to bring their
deer heads to a check station for
examination and testing. The
head is examined because lymph
nodes located in the head and at
the top of the neck are used to
determine if the deer has TB.

When removing the head leave
a few of the neck bones (vertebrae) intact so the lymph nodes
will not he damanged Antlers,
skull cap and cape may be
removed and will not affect testing. Test samples will be sent to
the DNR Rose Lake Wildlife Diecase Laboratory and hunters

## Deer Check Stations

Deer Cheek Stations
The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has several deer cheek stations set up in southeastern Michigan to help biologists evaluate the state's deer hord. Hunters are asked to bring in the head of deer they harvest so the DNR can obtain valuable information. In turn, hunters will receive a 1998 Deer Management Cooperator patch. Deer check stations are set up at the following locations. Before traveling to a specific field office it is advised to call ahead to confirm the location and hours.
