

# Ault's record 31 points paces Harrison victory

Senior guard Ali Ault set two school records Thursday while leading host Farmington Harrison to a 66-42 victory over North Farmington in girls basketball.

Ault scored a career-high and school-record 31 points to lead the Hawks, who finished the regular season with a 14-6 record.

In the process, Ault set another record with nine three-point field goals. She shot better than 56 percent from three-point range with 16 attempts.

Harrison also tied a team record with 14 triples, matching the number it had two years ago in a win over Westland John Glenn.

Kelly Taylor tossed in 12 points for the Hawks; Charlotte Blahfield had eight points and nine rebounds; and Karolyn Knutson added six points.

The Hawks scored 19 points in each of the first three quarters, leading 38-24 at halftime and 57-32 after three periods.

(North) coach (Linda) Perkins worked as hard as any coach in the state, and her team has

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given us two really good games," Harrison coach Pete Mantyla said, adding the Raiders (8-12) were in the game until the late third quarter.

"I know how much time she and her team put in. Every North Farmington game since I've been here has been tough."

North's Samantha McComb scored 19 points, making all nine of her free-throw attempts, and Katie Vitellie finished with 11 points.

The Raiders made 15 of 19 free throws, the Hawks eight of 10.

The district tournament starts this week, but Harrison and North don't play again until Wednesday. The Hawks will play the Farmington-West Bloomfield winner, and the Raiders meet the winner of the Mercy-Lahser game.

"We've had a great year and we're ready to let it all hang out in the state tournament," Mantyla said. "It's been a fun year and

we'll try to make it last as long as we can."

Mantyla was uncertain if senior guard Ari Ault, who has missed several weeks with a knee injury, would be able to play.

Ault might have played Friday if the Hawks had still been in contention for the league championship, according to Mantyla.

Instead, Ault spent several more days in physical therapy since Harrison was no longer in the running for first place.

"Hopefully, she'll have a chance to play next week, but it's up to her doctor and her family," Mantyla said.

"We like to have her back. If not, we'll go with what we've got and give it our best shot. We're not going to jeopardize her volleyball or softball season."

LADYWOOD 49, DEPORES 37: Solid rebounding and a strong finish in each half Thursday night carried host Ladywood to the victory in the Detroit Catholic League crossover game.

The Blazers hauled down 40 rebounds in the game, 24 on the offensive end, to overcome a 16-13 start by visiting Detroit St. Martin de Porres.

Ladywood compiled a 13-6 margin in the second quarter to take the lead and put the game away with a strong 17-9 fourth period.

The Blues (10-10) had three players at 10 points each: Melissa Harakas, who also had 10 rebounds; Michelle Harakas and Liz Orzech.

De Porres (12-7) was led by Leslie Ford with 12 points and Denise Caldwell with 10.

FRANKLIN 46, FARMINGTON 33: A 15-5 second quarter carried the Patriots to their third victory of the season.

The strong second quarter enabled Franklin (13-15) to take a 24-11 lead into the second half. The visiting Patriots stretched the margin to 34-10 after three periods.

Tera Morrill scored 26 points for Franklin to lead all scorers. Kirstin Marshall added six.

Both jagged paced Farmington (1-19) with 10 points and Jamie Jakacki scored six.

MERCY 64, KETTERING 40: Tina Mullins defeated visiting Detroit Kettering Wednesday, Nov. 12, 29-21 at halftime and outscored the Patriots in the third quarter, 11-1.

Senior Jessie Brennan scored 17 points and Junior Susie Robie 13 to lead the Marlins. Kettering's Angelica Lewis posted 13 points.

# Vikings upset Rocks, win Western Lakes girls title

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pointing from 25 feet at the buzzer, left them three points shy.

"We executed better than we have offensively," said Viking coach Steve Emert. "We had a bit of a letdown in the second quarter because they slowed it down and then so did we. But in that little spurt we had in the third quarter, we started moving our feet again."

The Central "spurt" was enough to keep it close when Salem's Grubbaugh started bombing, and hitting, from three-point land. Indeed, as far as offense was concerned, Grubbaugh was it for the Rocks; she finished with a game-high 14 points, including four threes. Three of those triples came on three consecutive shots in the third quarter.

"Wherever Grubbaugh was, we wanted to trap her," explained Emert. "And we wanted to guard the high post. We didn't want them to score from there, but more important we didn't want them to make an entry pass from there."

The high-post area should have been patrolled by Salem's Andrea Phillips, but except for the burst in the third quarter — the Rocks doubled their first-half point production of 15 points in the third period alone — she had no impact. Pruitt, a

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senior co-captain, was limited to seven points, six coming in the third.

One reason she had problems finding scoring room was the foul trouble experienced by teammate Christine Phillips, who had two personals in the game's first three minutes and fouled out after limited playing time without scoring a point. Phillips, another team co-captain, is Salem's low-post option; without her, the Vikings could concentrate on Pruitt, which they did.

Salem also didn't play with the necessary intensity, something most teams are expected to have with the state tournament approaching.

"We'd already accomplished a league championship," Salem coach Fred Thoma said. "They hadn't accomplished anything."

But the difference was the Viking defense, which drove Salem to the perimeter. Grubbaugh couldn't do it alone. After Pruitt's basket with 1:42 left in the third quarter, the Rocks got two more field goals — both of them threes — the rest of the game as the Vikings outscored them 14-6.

Central's three inside players accounted for 28 of their points, with Leah Douglas having 13. Rebecca Baldana added nine and Michelle Bartz six. Salem got seven points from its two inside threats, Pruitt and Phillips.

It remained that way until, with 1:31 remaining, Douglas was fouled by Christine Phillips (her fifth) on a put-back attempt. Douglas converted both free throws, giving Central its first lead since early in the second half.

The Rocks still had chances, but a turnover and two missed jumpers by Tiffany Grubbaugh, the last a desperation three-

shot, sealed the victory.
