"There was so much evidence in each case that it was pretty much procedural," said Farmington Public Safety Director Gary Goss, about the cases going to trial.

Also facing circuit court arraignment on Dec. 3 is Baynes, who is scheduled to be in court at 8:30 a.m. before Oakland Circuit Judge ditee Gilbert. A 47th District Court spokeswoman said Baynes' hearing on Monday was waived, automatically bounding the case over for trial Baynes remains jailed, with bond set at \$25,000 cash or surety.


