against the proposed store, Sanford said, "It doesn't seem like it's a popular thing ... Hapfully we'l be able to turn it away from being a retail space." Sanford said. With the exception of a few office buildings, the area is predominately residential. Residents fear a commer-cial operation of any type will disrupt their atterwise placid neighborhood.
