Tom and Holly Valent have operated the school for 10 years and love every detail. Tom Valent went to Santa School in New York years ago before the school was moved first to Bay City and eventually to Midland. He has been the local Santa for 22 years and constructed elaborate wooden sleights and reindeer for a downtown display.
The couple hosted 60 students during this year's class and their prestigious reputation brought in students from Switzerland, Australia and England.
The curriculum includes a history of St. Nicholas, customs around the world, different Santa legends, make-up, dress, Christmas songs, singing and dancing, About 25 percent of the students enrolled are there to become Mrs. Claus.

"It's really a lot of fun and I'm to the point now where I'm helping behind the seenes a lot, Barnhard said. "There were

three new Mrs. Claus' this year and they were petrified. But at the end one of them cried because she had such a great

Reservations for the class are tooked months in advance and the cost is \$235 a week. Participants provide their own lodging at local hotels but the cost includes three dinners.

"We only take 15 new students a year so mest of our students are repeat visitors," Mrs. Valent said. "Actually, we're really a secret. We don't advertise for new students and very few people know about us."

Barnhard, who also performs as a clown, is certainly glad her friends told her about the Santh School. She feels Mrs. Claus is inally starting to come into her own now with children and side her isn't a must.
