The commanders' deal expired June 30. Terms of the old contract are continuing until a new accord is reached. State law prohibits them from walking out.

With the public safety deal, salaries for officers at the top of the scale will increase from \$47,697 to \$49,128. Starting salaries will go up from \$31,547 to \$32,493.

For the public safety officers' contract, which expired Dec. 31, discussions began in October, Goss said.


