

Warriors top Falcons

Walled Lake Western knocked Farmington from the ranks of the unbeaten in Western Lakes Activities Association boys basketball Tuesday.

The Warriors beat the host Falcons doing what Farmington usually does best — playing defense — and took home a 51-43 victory.

Both teams are now 3-1 in the WLAA and share second place with Livonia Churchill, trailing North Farmington by one game. The Falcons are 4-2 overall, the Warriors 7-3.

Western led most of the way, holding quarter leads of 13-12, 23-19 and 31-24. Western was a point better in the finale, 20-19.

"It was a ball-control game. Both teams pressed at different times, but there weren't many good looks," Farmington scorekeeper Chip Bridges said.

"(The Warriors) played as a team on defense. If there was an open look, they closed it up in a hurry."

Kip Szostek scored 12 points to lead Western. Johnny Eagle scored 11. Jenero Dawood nine and Rob Pisha eight.

The Warriors made 18 of 33 free throws, the Falcons 15 of 23.

Senior C.J. Whitfield and junior Matt Mikel scored nine points apiece for Farmington. Senior Chad Seaborn finished with eight and senior Justin Matus seven.

CC best in giant slalom

There's nothing like a good one-two punch to knock the competition off the ski slopes.

And Redford Catholic Central has a good combination in junior Matt Gable and senior captain Scott Zaleski, who finished first and second Tuesday in the giant slalom to lead the Shamrocks to first place in a Southeast Michigan Ski League meet at Mount Brighton.

CC scored 30 points to beat runnerup Okemos by six. Brighton finished third at 53.

The other team Gable coaches, Farmington Hills Mercy, posted a strong third-place finish in the women's giant slalom to maintain its second-place standing in the overall point race.

PREP SKIING

Brighton won with 24 points. East Lansing had 43 and Mercy came in with 51. In the overall standings, Brighton leads followed by Mercy and Okemos.

"Gable kept his rears going," said his father and coach Tom Gable. "He's won every meet. And Zaleski is definitely skiing up to his potential."

"It's the second consecutive 1-2 finish for those two. It's exciting for those two. It's exciting."

Junior Eric Sullivan was a strong third scorer for the Shamrocks, winding up sixth overall, and tri-captain Mark Gursky took 21st.

Gable was clocked at 32.36 for his two runs, Zaleski 33.40, Sullivan 35.07 and Gursky 37.75. Joe Murray didn't score but he did finish 30th at 38.76. John Goebel was disqualified.

"Thirtieth is a respectable score," Gable said. "It's a short season so every race probably carries a little more weight than you'd like it to."

Catholic Central's next meet is tonight, the last evening meet of the season.

Okemos leads the SEMSL standings by two points over Catholic Central, which will not have Matt Gable today because he's attempting to qualify for the U.S. Junior National team. Brighton is in third place.

"But our boys are skiing strong and we can overtake that," Gable said. "Our boys are on a pace to do well right through the division and carry it on."

Mercy continues to improve

and Gable notes "I can't say how much I'm delighted in their performance. They're all skiing and improving with every race."

"Junior Nikki Anderson took a second and it's well deserved. She's been training really hard. She's focused and it's showing. She's knocking on the door for the top. She skied the flats really well."

Anderson's runnerup total of 36.56 was just 6 behind the winner's time.

"Another obvious surprise is (junior) Laura Burek," Gable said. "She broke into the top 10. She's skiing better and improving every time she heads down the course."

Burek's 41.37 was good for ninth place in the nine-team meet.

Amy McDuffee, a senior, took 12th with a combined time of 41.56 while sophomore Melissa Desautel, who had been finishing in the high 30s and 40s, dropped down to 28th place.

"It's a sign of good things to come for her," Gable said. "And right behind her is another of our juniors, Marcy Godlew."

Desautel had a 44.79 combined time to score points for the Marlins. Godlew didn't figure in the total but finished 31st and is a threat to break into the top four on her team next time out.

Godlew recorded a score of 45.56 while Carolyn Swart was 38th at 47.38.

"They're gaining experience," Gable said, "and while they're gaining experience, they're skiing very well next time out."

Brighton leads Mercy by six points in the SEMSL standings.

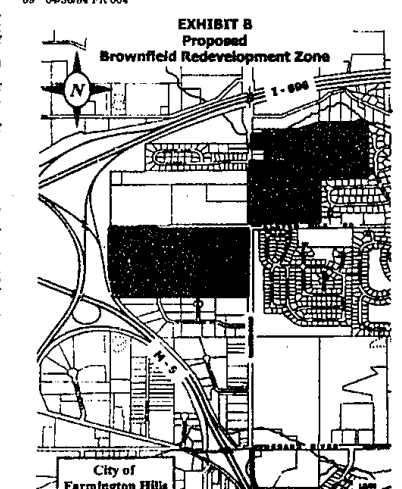
