The following are some suggestions to help guide you in making your decisions for planting

ing your decisions for planting winter beauty:

Herbaccous plants: ornamental onlon, late blooming flowers, I foot height; allium thunbergi, holds well into winter, I foot height; blackberry lilly, black seed pods, 3 feet height; blue out grass, symmetri-

cal shape, 2 feet height; plume grass, non-shattering, 12 feet height.

Deciduous shrubs: Korean




