
that time span and the amount of media attention the case has generated. Dwyer expects to see many others come forward.

Thompson has denied to police that he was scrually abused as a child. His parents died in 1995, and Dwyer said he bolieves he has one brother. Other than that, Thompson has said he has no friends. an "extension of the city clerk's files." That means anything on it is a public document and accessi-ble through the Freedom of

ble through the Freedom of Information Act.

The first electronic packets, other than practice run-throughs, will be for the Mon-day, March 20, regular count-meeting. Paper agendas will con-tinue to be pested for meetings and citizens will still be able to receive hard copies of agendas upon request.

upon request.
"I don't see that it presents any problem with the Freedom of Information Act," Donohue

said later. "All documents will be available at the clerk's office. They can be downloaded by request."

About the Open Meetings Act, which prohibits elected bodies from privately communicating toward a consensus on an issue. Donehue said there shouldn't be any problems "as long as they don't do on the computer what they can't do on the telephone." That was a reference to conference calls.

Meanwhile, sending e-mails to other council members would be the same as sending a memoran-

dum, he added. Where trouble could arise is if council members engage in an electronic "chat" room with the goal of discussing city issues, for example.

A master copy of the agenda – the "subpoenable version," according to council member Vicki Barnett – will be kept by the city. That version can not be altered, the council was told.

Stevo Brock, Farmington Hills city manager, said the "paperless packets" will help reduce time and expenses that the clerk's office now incurs to produce the paper agenda. Those savings will

city's central services department. The study session preceded the regular council meeting.

Lasley said large supplementary items, such as maps, will continue to be provided as hard copies.

"I'm looking forward to it," said council member Chris McRae. "It will cut down on staff time. ... We'll still get some paper."

McRee said that most of the council alroady is proficient on computers and that citizens will not lose out with the now system.

"The agendas will still be posted as they are now," McRee said. Regular citizens don't see all this background information anyway.

As he spoke he coelly flipped through the 87-page packet for Monday's regular meeting. Besides the computers, council members are also receiving a printer, complete with color and black-and-white ink cartridges.
