

# Area Commission on Aging to sponsor health fair at Costick Activities Center

If you need to get your vision, hearing or blood pressure tested or want to get screened for different types of cancer, the Farmington Commission on Aging's Project Healthy Living is for you. The commission will sponsor the health fair 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 12, at the Costick Activities Center, 28600 11 Mile Road. Anyone 18 and older is welcome to attend. Free tests and services will be offered on height and weight, vision, hearing, glaucoma, health education, nutrition counseling, blood pressure and referral.

In addition to these free tests, a number of other tests will be offered for minimal fees, including colorectal cancer kits for \$8, women's cancer antigen tests (CA125) for \$25, men's prostate specific antigen test for \$25, HPylori blood test screens for ulcers and gastritis for \$15 and

bone density test for \$25. The blood test panel consists of 23 profiles for \$25. A four hour fast is recommended before the blood panel test.

Dr. Stoven Forche, a Farmington Hills dermatologist, will be available to answer questions about moles, warts and other skin care concerns. Marcotte Dental Associates will check for oral cancer. Dr. Charlotte Hartzell will do ophthalmology counseling "Ask the Eye Doctor."

Hearing evaluation will be provided by the Deaf & Hearing Impaired Services. Botsford Hospital has assisted this year in helping to provide medical volunteers. For more information call the Project Healthy Living Hotline at (248) 424-8600.

## Hills man dies in crash with semi

A 57-year-old Farmington Hills man died Wednesday morning in a crash that occurred at Eight Mile and Inkster Roads at 11:30 a.m. The victim, whose name has not yet been released, was headed south in a passenger car on

Inkster Road, when he stopped for a red light. Hills Police Chief Bill Dwyer said a preliminary investigation indicates the driver then accelerated into the intersection and was struck by a semi-truck, which had been headed west on Eight Mile Road.

At this time, police believe alcohol wasn't a factor. The accident is still under investigation, and Hills police urge anyone with information to call the Traffic Section, 248-473-9686.

"Our council, within the next month or two, will look at a resolution," he said. Both mayors attended seminars and Bates spoke at the Michigan Women in Municipal Government Breakfast Wednesday morning. Hartsock felt the trip was worthwhile because of the information provided about state revenue sharing and the home rule petition drive. "It's always worthwhile to talk to council members and mayors in other communities about how they're tackling similar problems," Hartsock added.

"They do briefings on a lot of key municipal issues, and a lot of those things are important to Farmington Hills," Bates said, citing the city's concern over changes in personal property tax multiplier tables that could cost the city more than \$100,000. Having attended both the National League of Cities conference in Washington, D.C., and the MML's day at the Capitol,

Bates feels the investment in personally lobbying state and federal lawmakers does pay off for taxpayers in the long run. "These conferences give us information I don't know any other source for," she said. "And I think it's good for (lawmakers) to know you're paying attention, and there are things you're willing to fight for."
