District not likely to open its doors

Cohrenceville School District is not likely to open its doors to non-residents any time soon. The main reason? Money. Districts can elect to take part in the state's achool of choice option, accepting students from outside its boundaries. Clarenceville's small size and reputation might be attractive to outsiders, officials said.

At its April 12 meeting. Clarenceville's school board expects to make a formal decision whether to take part or opt out.

n. Districts must make a decision before May, according to the state's limited school of choice aid bill.

d Dill. Clarenceville's board chose not Clarencevillo's board chose not to participate in schools of choice last year. One trustee's mind is made up to remain out of the schools of choice option.

"I'm pretty well set on it," said Trustee Gary Garrison at a board meeting March 23.

Such a move doesn't make financial sense for a district with

a \$14.6 million annual budget, said Tom Tattan, Clarenceville superintendent. The main problem is the states continual under funding

The main problem is the state's continual under-funding of special education, he said. The cost to educate a special needs student runs \$15,000-\$45,000, depending on the severity of the disability, an Oakland Schools spokeaman estimated. Districts receive 28 cents in state aid for every dollar spent to educate on a special education student.

The state's school of choice law stipulates any district receiving a special education student accepts all funancial obligation.

"What business is going to have the special education student accepts all funancial obligation.

"What business is going to have the special education student occup to a \$40,000?" Tatten said. "That's the dilemma." Also, districts taking in the student receive the lesser of the two foundation grants between the child's new and fermer school district.

Families and students might move to the Clarencoville district for Oakland County's Intermediate School District's center-base special education programs. The Farmington Public Schools operates center-based programs for Clarencoville and other districts. The kid would never come in and be part of the Clarenceville district, Tattan said.

As families opt to go outside their home district, there is little incentive to pass local school bond and tax issues.

If a school's building is crumbling, the child will simply jump to a neighboring district, Tattan said.

Another factor is some of those who chose to transfer into another district are disgranted with the one they're currently in. "Often times they run into the same problems and dissatisfaction, and move right back, Tatan said.

Since districts receive state funding on a per-pupil basis, welcoming students from surrounding school systems is an option for those with declining enrollments.


