After opening Monday with a 19-50 loss to visiting Trey, host Farmington was beaton by Farmington Hills Mercy Wednesday, 17-2.


"Mercy won the longue championship last year, and Troy was the only team to beat them," Farmington scach Mitco Mehall said.

The Marlins are thinking seriously about a title repeat despite losing three key players to graduation from its Division I championship team.

The reason they remain so optimatic is the return of three all-aren players and the rapid development of some younger ones.

Morey's top player is one of the best in the state — junior Erin Borowlec, who was the individual runner-up last year and the top contender to be No. 1
this year.

Borowiec finished one stroke behind Kim Benedict of Rochester Adams in the state finals, shooting a course record of 73 the second day and finishing at 153. She was the Catholic League individual winner and averaged 39-38 strokes in dual meets.

"(Wednesday) she shot even par at practice, so I think she's ready, "Mercy conch Vicky Kowalski said. "She had a great summer; she couldn't wait for the season to start."
