# Rain shows where weaknesses are

It rained hard the last day of school before spring break and almost as hard the first day

Despite a few leaks at Farm-ington High School and Longacro Elementary School, the district's facilities managed to withstand the rainfall. Monday's rain

apparently did not cause the kind of leakage that took place Thursday, April 20, at Farming-ton High, with leaks springing in a couple of construction areas, said architect Ronald Aten, of the district's facilities depart-

the district's facilities department.

"That three-inch doluge we had (on April 20) was the first rain we had in a long time," Aton said Monday afternoon. "We found out where all the (structural) weaknesses are and get those corrected."

Aton said the amount of damage done by the rain wasn't even enough to make a claim with the district's insurance company, "I don't think it was even worth \$100."

There was one leak uncovered in the girls locker room in the new north-south corridor, Aten explained.
"That was the worst one," Aten said, noting that a roof pipe was improperly connected. "Water was puddling on the floor."
Another wet area was in the new technical-education wing, where some water snuck in because the metal wall flashing was not saug, Aten said.
None of the problems were severe enough to impact classes.
