Annual Open House promises family fun

Interesting mix of fun and safety awaits everyone who attends Sunday's Open House at the Farmington Hills Police Department.

The day's events — which include such popular activities as a moon walk, castle maze, balloon typhoon and prize givenways — will also provide many opportunities for parents and children to learn about safety. In addition, Hills police plan to launch a trigger lock givenway at the May 5 event, which will be held from noon to 4 p.m. on the

grounds at 11 Mile and Orchard Lake roads.

"It's geared toward the family," said crime prevention officer Bonnie Unruh. We get tons of little kids, and everything's free, except the Optimist Club will be there to sell food."

For the first time, Chief Bill Dwyer will open up the department's driving simulator, which replicates various road conditions for drivers. Farents can get a hands-on demonstration of child car seat installation, and the tours will include something the public rarely gets a look at the inside of the Hills lock-up. "During the open house, verything's opened up." Unruh said-You'll get to see the cells. And we have a new dispatch center."




