Farmington Hills Police arrested a resident of Green Hills Apartments this weekend, on charges that he invaded a neighbor's home.

Kyle Harden is free after posting 10-percent surety on \$2,000 bond, after his arraignment May 29 in front of Judge Joan Dudley.

The magistrate warned him as a condition of his bond he must stay away from the neighbor and not have any contact with her, or his bond will be revoked, said Hills Assistant Police Chief Chuck Nebus.

According to reports, the neighbor noticed on May 28 that a smoke detector had been installed 10 feet away from an existing detector in her apartment.

The following day, her son saw a man in their apartment and told his mother about it. She later tried to test the smoke detector and when the alarm didn't sound, removed the cover.

Because it looked odd, the report indicated, she called the apartment management and

learned they hadn't done the work. The woman contacted police, who searched Harden's apartment with his consent.

Officers reported finding an empty smoke detector box, operating instructions for the camera and keys that fit the neighbor's door lock.

Video tapes, a video camera and computer disks were confiscated.
