The Michigan International Track Invitational will bring together some of the fastest men and women, including soveral Americana who are pursuing a spot in the U.S. Olympic Track and Rold Trials in July. Qualifying standards must be met for athletes to compete in the Trials; that's what they'll attempt to do at this meet.

This meet has literally exploded," said meet director John Goodridge. "It's a very special event unfolding. Certainly, it is a premier lineary. The mea's mile, for instance, will feature Cannda's Kevin Sull'van, the 18th-fastest miler in the world in 1899, 1998 U.S. Olympian Paul McMullen and Konyan Ames Klypegon.

The women's 1,500 meters high-lighte Collette Liss, the U.S.A. indoor national mile runner-up, while the men's 800 includes Trinity Townsend, the seventh-ranked American at that distance in 1999.

The women's 800 will feature three women who have been very close to the U.S. qualifying time in the 800 of 2:05.0: Jill McMullen of Ypsilanti, Melissa Smith of Grand Valley State and Hope Sanders of the Indiana Invaders cub.

In the 400, Nigorian Clement Chukwu (16th fastest in the world last year) will compete.
On a closer-to-home note, high school sensation Dathan Ritzenhein of Rockford will try to reach the U.S. Olympic Trials qualifying standard of 13:47 in the 5,000-meter run. Ritzenhein, the Footlocker national high school cross country champion, won both the 1,600 and 3,200 races at last weekend's state meet, esting a new state record of 4:08.08 in the 1,600.

He'll be up against some tough company, including four Americans who-have-aiready qualified for the U.S.

Trials, which start July 13.

The meet will begin at 7 p.m. and last for approximately two hours.

It was the second district title in three seasons and fourth in seven for Harrison (17-10-1), which roturns to the same Birmingham Seaholm site for a regional tournament this week.
