Write-in offers no competition

Incumbents Brouillette and Sharp re-elected

Voters - again - were few for a Farmington school election. But enough showed up Monday to easily re-elect incumbents Priscilla Brouillette and Gary Sharp to the board of educa-

Brouillette and Sharp had been uncontested in the race for two four-year terms until Friday afternoon, when Farmington parent Melody Jaske

launched her write-in candidacy. But with just 1,355 (2.3 percent) of the districts 68,160 voters casting ballots, the incumbents breezed past Jasko – who only collected 242 votes, an estimated 10.5 percent of all votes cast.

Collecting 1,068 votes (46 percent) was Brouillette, who earned her second four-year terms.

"I'm honored to serve another four years," Brouillette said, after the final results were tallied Monday night at

Families heart of new-look festival

Change is good, or so goes the old axiom. Organizers for the new-look, new-name founders festival next week will begin finding out if that applies to the Farmington Area Family Fest.

JUNE 22-24

As the name implies, family fun and participation are the major geals of the annual event, viewed as a showcase of downtown Farmington. But changes are being made that festival manager-promoter Mike Watts and others are hopeful will draw new people and slap on a new stamp of identity. At least 150,000 people are expected to stop by between Thursday, June 22, and Saturday, June 24. This year marks the first time the event is taking place in June, instead of following the July 4 holiday weekend.

Hills water rates going up, sewer rates headed down

What could have been a \$1.23-per-thousand-cubic-feet increase in Farm-ington Hills water rates has been low-ared to 63 cents-per-thousand because of income from the city's water supply account.

Officials will consider the Oakland County Drain Commission's rate recommendation at their June 19 meeting, along with a proposal to lower sewer rates by 37 cents. City Manager Steve Brock received the recommendation May 16, which included a detailed explanation of the factors in play.

"It's not as simple as it might appear, Brock said.

The proposed water rate increase has several components, including a 35-cent, "pass through increase from Detroit Water and Sowerage Department. The charge for the county's operation and maintenance of the city water system will also go up by 25 cents.

implementation of new meter reading technology.

This increase is primarily due to our new Radio Read Meter Program that will be installed in the city limits of Farmington Hills within the next several years, said Deputy Drain Commissioner Douglas Buchholz.
