Residents cautioned on health of trees

Farmington Hills residents may have noticed that som sycamore trees in our area began losing their leaves early this summer, especially in the southeast section of the city.

According to the Farmington Hills Planning Department, this is a common problem that frequently occurs after a cool, wet pring. The sycamores lose their leaves because of a fungus discass called "anthranose" which looks severe but does not seriously affect the trees health.

For residents concerned about sycamore trees adjacent to their property, the city of Farmington Hills is initiating a program to ducate the public about anthrasnose, address requests for tree removal, and promote development of a healthier

street-tree population.

Though it's not possible to eliminate anthracnose, thinning the crown of the syzamore will allow sunlight and air circulation to dry the excess moisture that lets the fungus thrive. Destroying fallen leaves and twigs will help control the spread of the infection. Treatments such as sprays and injections are suppossed to the spread of the s ments such as sprays and injec-tions are not effective.

The city will plant a new tree to replace any sycamore removed from the public right-of-way. The new trees will be three-inch caliper deciduous trees, such as oaks or hard maples, and this replacement process will eventually result in a healthier street-tree conclusion.


Because of the significant number of sycamores in some parts of Farmington Hills, it will be several years before the new tree population is in place and growing.




