The legislatures of our various states, as well as the federal government itself, are forever busy themselves with the framing of new laws. "I am fined for failure to provide good drinking water on my passenger train," a Rhode Islander might say, to which a fellow railroader in South Carolina would add:

"In this state a jail sentence follows a neglect to provide cuspiders for every two seats in our cars."

In Wisconsin a baker must serve three weeks in jail for sleeping in his bakery.

In California nurses are punished by fine or imprisonment should they fail in the proper instance to notify the physician of certain phases of illness in their patients.
