Washington

By n voto of 188 to 163 the Demo-cratic free augar bill passed the house at Washington. Its passage was helpod by 24 Insurgent Republican votes, al-though this was offset by the defection of seven Democratic votes against the bill by members from Louisiana and Colorato.
