Hills woman charged with leaving baby alone

A 35-year-old Farmington Hills woman is scheduled to face a district court judge Wednesday after receiving a ticket for allegedly leaving her 18-month-olt son alone in a car at the Gateway Center park-

ing lot.

The woman, police said, could be ordered to pay a \$100 fine from one of the 48th District Court judges in Bloomfield Hills. The misdemeanor charge of leaving a child inside an unattended vehicle also carries a

potential maximum jail sentence of up to 90 days.

We're not saying she's a bad mother, and Lt. Carl Fuhs, spokesman for West Bloomfield police. It's just something that happens, but it's a violation. Fuhs said police were called shortly before 6 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 30, when a man parked his vehicle next to a 1995 Saab with a toddler sleeping in a baby chair in the back seat. The man feared for the baby's safety because the temperature at the time was under 20 degrees.

The West Bloomfield and Farmington Hills stores were the only Sears operations to close in Michigan. The compa-ny also announced the closing of four of its full-line depart-ment stores nationwide last

week.
About 2,400 Sears employees
will lose their jobs, according to
published reports from Associated Press

The closings were announced as Sears released its monthly sales update showing a 1.1-percent decline in revenues from comparable domestic stores

during the holiday period -\$4.42 billion for the five weeks

during the holiday period during the holiday period 34.42 billion for the five weeks ended Dec. 30.

"Like other retailers, general industry softness and difficult weather conditions dampened our holiday season sales," said Alan Lacy, Sears' new chairman and chief executive officer. Sears also signaled it may exit the termite-pest control business. The company said it is taking a one-time charge of about \$11.5 million in the fourth quarter due to Sears Termite and Pest Control, citing continuing losses.
Sears has struggled with apparel sales for years, but despite weak holiday numbers, the company said sales of appliances, sporting goods, lawn and garden items, footwear and home fashions were all strong over the holidays, while Sears Tire Group and The Great Indoors both showed double-digit increases.
Sears stock rose 94 cents to \$36.97 Thursday afternoon on the New York Stock Exchange.
