Lauhoff said the Beautification
Commission has not been popular among the people who volunlar among the people who volunteer to serve on various city commissions and committees. Other commissions, he said, such as the Gevernor Warner Mansion Development Committee don't seem to have a problem attracting membership:
City Council members plan to ponder the Beautification Commission's lack of attraction for volunteers, make changes

accordingly, then reincarnate the commission.

"We believe that it is important that time be spent reviewing the operation, goals and objectives of the commission with the intent of finding new community members willing to volunteer," Lauhoff said.
