City officials have been asked to balance the varied interests in the project, which is no easy task. Residents in surrounding subdivisions are concerned about traffic, noise and stormwater drainage, as well as the continued paving of what little open space is left in their community.

We have serious doubts as to whether this tentative alliance of property owners and developers will survive. At least one neighboring property owner hasn't signed on and everyone still has to come to terms with a complex Planned Unit Development agreement.

Citizens have good reason to be suspicious of such agreements. They are, by nature, non-specific as to design details.

Northwestern Highway, 14 Mile and Orchard Lake Roads are major thorough fares, places where this kind of development belongs. This acreage, designated in the Master Plan as a Special Flanning Area, deseryes special treatment.

For all of its wague promises, the PUD process is the best possible way to get it.

Take the MEAP

MEAP—it is not a ratings game. Regardless of the underreporting of the MEAP results or what you would like to believe about the MEAP, there are two simple facts: It tests an individual student's ability to choose the correct answer to questions on material that he should know; and, for over a decade, it has been offectively used by some schools to correct the learning deficiencies of the students who took the test and to adjust the building portfolio of instruction to prevent the reoccurrence of the deficiencies in future students. This would not be true if the MEAP were as flawed or inconsequential as some would like to believe or would like you to believe.

The variation in MEAP results between buildings and the elementary and secondary levels identify educational issues and inequities that, to address and fix, need to be acknowledged and undorstood at the community, district, building, and classroom level. Playing the MEAP results as a ratings games does not contribute to the correction of these problems. Treating the MEAP as a flawed or meaning-less test or to excuse your student from taking the test does not contribute to the correction of these problems. Your expectation should be 100-percent proficiency on the MEAP within the margin of error of a given year set peculiarities and human error of the students taking the test. Where that performance level doesn't crist, a problem does exist. Colleges and universities have added MEAP-style testing to their application process and as a prerequisite for their introductory level classes. Businesses have added remedial training classes of MEAP-tested skills. This is consistent with Farmington's secondary school MEAP results. It is inconsistent with inflated grade point averages and bloated honor roils. By dismissing the MEAP, or playing the resulting game, who are you fool-
